


99 Names of God







Clare enlists the services of an Aboriginal tracker who is also marked by trauma from his own violence-filled



past. The film was selected to compete for the Golden Lion at the 75th Venice Inernational Film Festival where it won the Special Jury Prize. The film received positive review for its performances, atmosphere, cinematography, screenplay, scope and acknowledgement of racial violence in Australia.
